President's Address

November 2020

One month ago, I wrote to all of you in hopes of challenging our "perfect teacher" narratives, to make plans as to where you are going to pull back when times get tough.

In the past 30 days, we have had significant changes take place here in Garden Valley. We had our first COVID cases in our schools, multiple staff and student isolations, classes that have moved to remote learning, public schools shifting to a Restricted Orange response level, the introduction of legislation to move to provincial bargaining, and a provincial shift to Red, just to name a few.

Throughout these changes, I have heard the constant call for more staff to help fill needs, additional family and personal sick leave so that staff can adhere to provincial health guidelines, and a sense of exhaustion and frustration coming from multiple sources. One of the sources of frustration is the consistent lack of clarity from the provincial government. However, I do not want to discuss their faults or missteps in this address. Nor do I want to discuss the unsustainability of the current provincial practices. Preaching to the choir may be fine on Sundays but there is a reason that Sundays only happen once a week.

This month, I want to share a message of thanks.

An honest and meaningful act of gratitude-- whether it be mentally, through thank you notes, encouraging words, gifts etc.—shifts our focus from our issues to our supports. This shift is beneficial for our well-being and longevity. Our current state is far from perfect, but a sentiment of thanks can build that connection that we are all desiring right now.

Mr. Rogers has a famous quote about people who help in difficult times:

"When I was a boy and I would see scary things in the news, my mother would say to me, 'Look for the helpers. You will always find people who are helping. "

Thank you to all the people who have helped and continue to help within our education community. Thank you to:

- Our retired teachers who choose to fill terms and serve as guest teachers.
- Our custodial staff who have put in many extra hours with unexpected deep cleans.
- Our principals, vice principals, guidance and resource teams who have worked hard to be creative as they solve the usual challenges in addition to COVID concerns.
- Our EAs, clinicians, library staff, and school liaisons who help us ensure that our students are well taken care of and that we are just one part of our students' villages.
- Our bus drivers who are often the first and last divisional staff that many of our students see in a day, and they take care of getting them between home and school with care.
- Our classroom, specialist, vocational, and itinerant teachers who offer consistency and kindness to our kids while adapting to unprecedented challenges.
- Our guest teachers and those on LTPs who are filling the gaps that help keep our system going.

This list could be pages longer to talk about supportive parents, those in decision-making roles who are choosing to support teachers, healthcare workers, and the community as a whole for the support that they have shown us. I want to finish with one last thank you to the members of GVTA.

Thank you to those of you who continue to engage honestly and openly about your struggles, concerns, successes, and triumphs. To all who are making choices that are the best for themselves, their families, and their specific situations. To those who continue to mask-up, wash hands, manage the inconveniences of these protocols in order to mitigate the risk for the rest of us – thank you. It is because of your continued diligence that we will be able to endure this COVID marathon and have more loved ones make it through with us.

As we move forward into the final month of 2020, I hope that you can access a mindset of gratitude to help support you and yours. I hope that clarity may find you so that you will be envigored and that you may be able to continue this race. I hope that you find connection and solace to remind you how cherished you are.

Provincial Bargaining

Bill 45 has been introduced in the legislature. Bill 45 makes changes to existing legislation to allow for provincial collective bargaining. The theory behind the provincial bargaining model is that, if followed as intended, this model ensures greater equity in salaries and working conditions across divisions. Across the province, there are currently variances in collective agreement language regarding items such as salaries, preparation time, extra-curricular activities, and more.

Although MTS does support provincial bargaining, there is current language within this bill that calls for major change. Although this language may change before it is passed and proclaimed, some information to be aware of is as follows:

Garden Valley Teachers' Association members work on the traditional lands of the Anishinaabe, and the homeland of the Métis nation. GVTA respects the Treaties that were made on this territory.

- This bill incorporates the division's ability to pay into the arbitration process, which impedes the neutrality of an arbitration board. This clause is cause for concern, as it is reminiscent of legislation enacted in the 1990s, which undermined teacher collective bargaining.
- The word school "board" is removed from the legislation and is replaced by school "division(s) or district(s)." The only reference to school boards is the recognition of the Manitoba School Boards' Association.
- The most recent local collective agreement will be in effect until a provincial agreement can be bargained.
- The implementation date of this bill will be dependent on its passage through the legislative process. This passage may happen as early as Spring 2021.

MTS ACTIONS AND REACTIONS YOUR UNION WORKING FOR YOU

THE MANITOBA TEACHERS' SOCIETY

Over the past months, MTS has heard from hundreds of members across the province about the challenges of teaching in this COVID-19 reality. This feedback has been instrumental in helping guide our advocacy and lobbying efforts with government.

Here are some of the actions we have taken on your behalf, along with some outstanding issues that we are continuing to raise with government.

Safety

MTS was successful in its call for the mandatory wearing of masks in public schools.

The Society is calling on the government to:

- reduce class sizes to help achieve the two-metres of physical distance
- hire more teachers and EAs to facilitate a reduction in class size
- provide better access to Health Links and COVID-19 testing for school staff

Consistency

MTS was successful in ensuring that teachers can now stay home when ill, without having to provide a sick note.

The Society is calling on the government to:

• mandate policies and protocols to ensure optimal safety for all staff, such as ensuring that all school divisions adhere to public health orders for conditions under which students can return to school after being ill

Achievable expectations

MTS was successful in lobbying the government to suspend Grade 12 exams for January 2021.

The Society is calling on the government to:

- · review provincial report card requirements for teachers and school leaders
- suspend the requirement for teacher and support staff evaluations this year
- credit school divisions with the three non-instructional days that were taken on September 2-4, with the mandated early return to school for teachers
- permit school divisions to schedule weekly non-instructional time, up to a half-day, for schools to plan, prepare, pivot, and provide sustainable instruction and support for all students

Blended-learning

MTS will not accept a model in which teachers provide in-person and remote instruction simultaneously. In Code Orange, when temporary remote learning is offered as a choice for parents, the impact on teacher workload is intensified.

The Society is calling on school divisions to:

- discontinue the 'duplex model' (splitting one classroom into two to allow for two-metres of physical distance. This model results in one teacher being responsible for two distinct sets of learners in two locations.)
- hire more teachers and EAs
- · provide increased planning time to coordinate new learning and delivery formats
- provide increased planning time for teachers who are reassigned
- · provide resources and professional learning opportunities
- provide assurance that cameras required for blended-learning, will only be used for instruction purposes and not as a means of monitoring employees

Mental health

MTS continues to raise mental health and wellness as a serious concern.

The Society is calling on school divisions to:

- establish mechanisms for ongoing teacher feedback
- invest in supports to prevent teacher burn out
- provide supports for the social and emotional impacts of positive cases in a school
- set expectations and provide supports for teachers to set boundaries to maintain work/life balance
- · provide clear and consistent communication of roles and expectations

Substitute teachers

There is a shortage of substitute teachers under normal circumstances, which will now be far more pronounced as teachers heed public health advice to stay home when sick.

The Society is calling on the government to:

- · create a plan for recruiting and retaining substitute teachers
- establish a bank of sick days for COVID-19 related purposes, accessible to substitute teachers

When in doubt, reach out

Perhaps you are being asked to clean your classroom, move furniture or drive a child with flu-like symptoms home. Is this part of your job? When in doubt, reach out.
