## **Notice of Policy Change**

During the GVTA executive meeting on December 1, a policy change was proposed and is tabled to be passed during the January 12 executive meeting. Proposed policy changes are as follows:

### **Collective Bargaining Update**

Over the past month, GVTA has agreed to multiple Letters of Understanding. Letters of Understanding are primarily used to resolve bargaining issues between rounds of bargaining. The letters have allowed for the following:

All members will now be able to have greater access to family medical leave days

- Past practice has allowed **5 sick leave days** to be used for family medical purposes
- The new practice will allow for **all sick leave days** to be used for personal or family medical purposes.

Substitute Teachers will have income protection if they are exposed to COVID at work

• If a sub is required to self-isolate due to a COVID exposure at work, they will receive paid

administrative leave or a work from home option.

• Part-time teachers who sub would also be entitled to the paid administrative leave or work from home option for the substitute portion where applicable.

All members will be able to access extra-curricular carryover

- Unused hours from 2019-20 were carried over to this year. That carry over will extend to the 2021-22 school year.
- We are still negotiating for the ability to carry over extra-curricular days where they remain unused from 2019-20.

However, our work is not finished. Negotiations through GVTA will continue to seek support for members with low sick leave. GVTA is also ready to bargain locally and to work within the proposed provincial structure.

In January, Pembina Trails Teachers' Association begins their arbitration hearings. This is the second arbitration for teachers since Bill 28 was introduced. The award determined by the panel in this arbitration could affirm the pattern established in the Louis Riel arbitration. However, arbitration awards take some time to develop and it could take until mid-March before the results are released.

The bill that has been introduced to create Provincial Bargaining (Bill 45) is working its way through the legislature. At this time, Bill 45 has received first reading and is on track to be passed somewhere between mid-March and June 2021. Currently Bill 45 would implement single-tier provincial bargaining. Meaning there would be one bargaining table for all teachers across the province. This would be a change from the current practice where each of the school divisions and Locals negotiate individually. The language in this bill could change as it moves through the legislative process so more details will be provided as they are made available.
