Good evening, members. My name is Joel Swaan, and I'm seeking your support as I run for re-election to the provincial executive. I'm humbled that the members of Garden Valley Teachers' Association have nominated me for this honour.

When people ask why I do this work, my answer has always been with the highest respect for members. I do this work – as a school rep, as a bargaining chair, as a local president, and now on the provincial executive including my work as chair of the first provincial collective bargaining committee which had our first ever provincial opening package ratified by members in March – I do this work, so that teachers who got into education because they love teaching could do so, without worrying about what lies behind the curtain. In the classroom or when performing their duties – whatever they are - members need to be able to focus on their students, their curricula, any of their duties, knowing that someone has their back. They need to be able to teach unencumbered because they aren't worried about their benefit plans, or family medical days, or salary schedule. Its beauty is in how the sum of the parts make up the whole.

So, I don't have a big spiel around the state of education in the province and how I'm the only person who can fix them. I'm honoured to be here with my esteemed colleagues, and I think each of them would bring different strengths to the table. I can't tell you that I alone am the solution to problems in education in Manitoba, but I am committed to the membership and the ideals of the Society, I'm a strong advocate, and I lead through service.
